HROUGHOUT THE WORLD, teachers' unions have emerged among the most well-organized and politically active of social movements. In the U.S. alone, teachers are the most highly unionized group in the country, with over four million members. As massive cuts in government spending ripple through our schools and universities—especially devastating poor communities and communities of color—teachers' unions are increasingly confronting the neoliberal agenda, global in scope, that contests the very notion of free, quality public education for all. Meanwhile, attacks on tenure mount and teachers are increasingly scapegoated themselves for the decline in public education.
