With a quarter of the human population, critical contributions to global cultures and economies, and stark environmental and social challenges, South Asia presents an enormous opportunity for research and scholarship.

As sweeping economic and cultural changes in Afghanistan, Bangladesh, Bhutan, India, Nepal, Pakistan, and Sri Lanka increasingly drive world trends, institutions studying South Asia have left critical issues unexplored:

What does "justice" mean in the midst of economic growth and entrenched gender and caste roles?

How can explorations of inequality engage the region's politics?

What are the implications of South Asia's advances and challenges in a world interconnected through business, politics, and culture?

Home to the planet's largest movie industry, the region's commercial, classical, and avante garde arts influence culture everywhere. India's explosion in per capita income—and widening wealth gap—play a growing role in geopolitics.

South Asia's diaspora feeds innovation and business success worldwide, and particularly in Silicon Valley. Since 1980, the U.S. population with South Asian heritage has grown rapidly. It may be the most successful immigrant group in U.S. history, with extraordinary entrepreneurial, educational, and professional accomplishments.

With faculty renowned for work in South Asian art forms, a record of groundbreaking research and education, and a commitment to social and economic justice, the UC Santa Cruz Center for South Asian Studies shapes the cutting edge of the field.

#### The effects of the diaspora:


South Asia's diverse global diaspora has created profound economic, political, scientific, and cultural effects worldwide. Yet it is understudied. Our researchers explore how these transnational populations are rediscovering their heritages and what it means to be part of a community that defies geographic boundaries.

**History**: The center's research and educational programs illuminate the intellectual and social history of the region and its implications for contemporary world events.

**Culture and fine art:** The center promotes performances and the study of fine art, music, dance, and food across South Asian cultures. Drawing on social justice interventions such as street theater as well as classical and experimental art forms, and commercial works like Bollywood, UC Santa Cruz faculty explore what art reveals about social power.



Our faculty and researchers are doing pioneering work in South Asian studies, influencing a variety of disciplines.




#### **Economics**

Distinguished economist Nirvikar Singh recently coauthored the book *The Other One Percent: Indians in America,* examining the history and challenges of the diaspora and its global implications.

#### **Environmental justice**

Professor of Environmental Studies Ravi Rajan studies the connection between the environment and human rights, including the effects of natural disasters. What happens when we view environmental challenges, such as the availability of clean water and sustenance, as a fundamental right? Examining issues from this perspective can provide a new impetus for solutions.


#### **Contemporary culture**

Madhavi Murty was a journalist in Bombay before coming to the U.S. She's now an assistant professor of feminist studies with a particular focus on pop culture in South Asia and its entanglement with Hindu nationalism and neoliberalism.

#### Literature and language

Professor G. S. Sahota focuses on South Asian languages and Indian literary and intellectual history, especially in Urdu, Sanskrit, Punjabi, Hindi, and English. He was awarded the Mellon Foundation's Modern Language Initiative Outstanding First Book Prize for Late Colonial Sublime: Neo-Epics and the End of Romanticism, which explores Hindi and Urdu literary culture in British India.

#### **Classical Indian music**

Dard Neuman, the Hasan Endowed Chair in Classical Indian Music and associate professor of music at UC Santa Cruz, studies musical cultivation, transmission, and performance of Hindustani music in 20th century North India, as well as the role of music in social action.

#### **Performance**

Cynthia Ling Lee is an interdisciplinary performance-maker whose choreography and scholarship explore postcolonial, queer, and feminist-of-color approaches to experimental South Asian performance. Recent publications include journal articles in Studies in South Asian Film and Media and Indian Theatre Journal and co-written book chapters in Queer Dance: Meanings and Makings and Dance Matters Too: Memories, Markets, Identities.

She is a member of the Post Natyam Collective, a transnational web-based coalition of artists of color known for their critical and cutting-edge approaches to South Asian dance.





#### **Inequality and social issues**

Associate Professor of Anthropology Megan Moodie's We Were Adivasis: Aspiration in an Indian Scheduled Tribe explores social mobility and inequality in India, shedding light on realities of marginalized groups and affirmative action globally. Moodie lived with an indigenous community or "scheduled tribe" near Jaipur, studying outcomes of affirmative action, gender relations, and everyday practices. She specializes in feminist political and legal anthropology and experimental ethnographic writing.


